PERSONA INFORMATION

NAME: James William Gatliff

TIME PERIOD: ANO 1765

GEOGRAPHIC REGION: The smaller outlying settlements around Williamsburg in the Colony of Virginia

OCCUPATION: Clerk

NARRATIVE:

My name is James William Gatliff, I am the oldest son of James Gatliff. I was born in the year 1741, putting me in my 24th year. When I was only 14, my father was a member of the Augusta County (Virginia) Militia and had the misfortune of following General Braddock against Fort Duquesne, he died in the year 1755. When I reached my 18th year (1759), I too joined the Militia to fight against the French. Because the officer's knew my father and knew how important education was for his children they knew that I could read and write and made me a clerk in my company.

When the war ended in 1763, I decided to trade some of the land grant that I had received for Militia duty towards a small plot of land in one of the settlements outside of Williamsburg. I've built a house there and currently work as a clerk in a store-house. But I am still entitled so more acreage due to my land grants and the idea of moving out onto the frontier appeals to me. Fincastle county sounds like wonderful county with many options open to someone like me.

RAN away from the Subscriber, about the 10th of this Instant, an Irish Convict Servant Man, named Barnaby Allay, about 50 Years of Age, speaks tolerable good English, and pretends to understand the Sailor's Business, he has an odd Way of walking that he makes Use of when he gets in Company to drinking, and seems to go almost on his Knees; had on when he went away, an old Pea-Jacket, Sailor's Trousers, Oznabrigs Shirt, an old Hat cock'd up with three corners, an old yellow Wig, old Shirt, speckled Worsted Hose; also took with him a check'd Shirt, and a Silk Cap. Whoever secures the said Runaway, so that I may have him again, shall have a Pistole Reward, besides what the Law allows, if taken in this Colony, and if in any other Two Pistoles, paid by John Quarles, Jun."

"RAN away from the Subscriber, living in Henrico County, near the Falls of James River, on Sunday Night, being the 19th Instant, an Apprentice, about 20 Years of Age, named Richard Green, a House Carpenter and Joiner by Trade, about 5 Feet 9 Inches high, slim-made, thin Visage, freckled, and very talkative, with long small Legs; he had when

he went away a blue Cloth Coat and Waistcoat, lin'd with blue Shalloon, the Coat is short waisted with long Skirts, an old white Devonshire Kersey Coat, with a lying Collar, formerly fac'd with Velvet, but wore off, a Pair of new tann'd Sheep Skin Breeches with a Bawdy-house Flap, with carv'd white Metal Button, a Pair of blue Worsted Stockings, two Pair of blue Yarn ditto, Virginia-made Shoes, with carv'd Silver Shoe Buckles, two white Shirts, a Neck Cloth, two Virginia Cotton blue and white strip'd Shirts, and a Virginia-made Hat: he went away in Company with one James Innes, a Scotsman, about 24 Years of Age, speaks very plain English, about 5 Feet 6 Inches high, pale Complexion, flat-footed, knock-knee'd, and carries one of his Toes very much out as he walks, a Knot on one of his Wrists, occasion'd by his Arm having been broke: He serv'd his Time on Rappahannock River, and had when he went away, a coarse blue Cloth Coat, lin'd with coarse red Shalloon, a new Pair of Buck-skin Breeches, a Pair of old dim, and a Pair of light colour'd ditto, a green Waistcoat much worn, with white, flat, eight-square Metal Buttons of two Sorts, and bound when new with green Cord, whereof there is some Remains yet, a Pair of blue and white clouded Yarn Stockings, a Pair of Scotch Shoes new soled, a new Castor Hat, and several other Cloaths: They both have short Hair, and wear white Caps: They stole from the Subscriber a hunting Saddle with a Hog-skin Seat, green Cloth Housing, with green and white strip'd Worsted Lace; they also stole two Horses from Mr. Thomas Atcheson, at the Falls of James River, one a middle siz'd dull Bay, the other a Chesnut Sorrel: Their Brands and Flesh-marks, if any, unknown to me. Whoever apprehends the said Men and Horses, so that I may have them again, shall have Five Pistoles Reward if taken in Virginia, and Ten if out of it; or, Three for Richard Green, and Two for James Innes if taken in Virginia; and Six for Green, and Four for Innes if elsewhere, paid by Samuel Du-Val."

"RAN away from the Subscriber, an English Servant Man, named John Bartholemew; he is a short fat Fellow, about 5 Feet 4 Inches high, about 26 Years of Age, by trade a Taylor, had on when he went away, an old light colour'd Cloth Coat, and Waistcoat, dark brown Breeches, a brown Wig, and a small flapt Hat; he took with him a Wallet, a dark brown Cloth Coat, lapell'd, with Blue Lining and gilt Buttons, a Scarlet Waistcoat not finished, and grey Baragon Breeches. Whoever takes up the said Run-away, and brings him to me, shall have Four Pistoles Reward if taken in Virginia, and Six Pistoles if taken out of this Colony, paid by me, Robert Hutchings."
